Wednesday, June 9, 2010

CLERGY EXECUTIVE SESSION: Bishop Lindsey Davis (Louisville Area) presiding.

Bishop Davis called the executive session to order.

Rev. David Grout led the session in singing of “And Are We Yet Alive.”

Tom Smith moved that several groups (Provisional Members, Associate Members, Full-Time, Part-Time and student local pastors, diaconal ministers, those members of the Good News media team needed to operate the various media equipment used in the session and those persons coming to receive their license to preach) be admitted to the session without voice or vote. This was approved.

Smith moved that Dr. Phil Hill be elected to take minutes of the meeting. This was approved.

Smith moved that Brad Smart, Karen Stigall, Bonnie MacDonald, Shannon Boaz, Lynn Beach, David Grout, Bob Cooper, Wade Arp, Mark Dickinson, Bill Rounsaville, Freddie Patterson, Faron Owen, Ray Snider be elected tellers. This was approved.

Tom Grieb, Chair of the BOM, shared an opening statement concerning the collegiality of the clergy. He shared thoughts about “call” and the “life together” for which clergy are called to live out in their daily lives.

The Business of the Annual Conference was presented.

d) Bishop Davis interrupted reporting to recognize Rev. David Fultz. David Fultz addressed the body. He stated that he had placed his Conference relationship upon retirement with Christ Church in Lexington. One year later he was offered a job at Church of the Savior in Jessamine County which he accepted. He stated he reported same information to his Charge Conference in 2005 without question. On February 12, 2010, he stated he was presented from Bishop Davis' office with an ultimatum to cease and desist from his duties at Church of the Savior or withdraw from his ministerial office or face complaint. He stated that many questions have been raised out of lack of information concerning retired persons in the Book of Discipline and therefore he seeks answers from the Judicial Council concerning those in retired status within the church.

Rev. Tom Grieb, Chair of the Board of Ordained Ministry responded. He stated that it is a matter of principle, accountability and understanding for all those within the clergy: active or retired. As a result, this matter has far reaching effects and speaks directly to our relationship together. He stated that Rev. Fultz's case is a matter of Administrative Process as there was a complaint filed by Rev. Mark Girard, District Superintendent of the Lexington District, and given to Bishop Davis. After review, Bishop Davis decided to move along the lines of the Administrative tract. Rev. Fultz was interviewed by the Conference Relations Team of the Board of Ordained Ministry, which recommended that there was unwillingness on Rev. Fultz's part to perform Ministerial duties and that remedial action be taken under paragraph 363.2f declaring that Rev. Fultz surrender his credentials "because of his unwillingness to perform ministerial duties." Some examples of 2008 Book of Discipline paragraphs cited were: ¶362 outlined the area of complaint. ¶363.2f cites surrender of Ministerial office; ¶332 – Elders are ordained to a lifetime of ministry; ¶358.2 cites ministry must be lived out in the life of a particular charge conference; ¶343.1 cites only Elders in effective relationship can be appointed; ¶303.3 ordained to a life time covenant in the United Methodist Church.

Rev. Grieb reported the Board of Ordained Ministry affirmed the recommendation from the Conference Relationship Team at its meeting on May 18, 2010 with 42 affirmations, one abstention and no negative votes.

Others who spoke from the body of the Executive Session were:

- Rev. Buddy Coleman cited Question 25 asked "we can approve non-Methodists to serve a Methodist church, but a Methodist can't serve in non-Methodist relationship?" Rev. Grieb responded by reminding that service must be under appointment.

- Rev. Greg Shannon stated that this “challenged the authority of God v. Methodist church” and asked questions concerning insurance issues including the loss of pension for Rev. Fultz. Rev. Grieb clarified that pension would not be lost.
- Rev. Clarence Barnes asked: “Why am I now receiving a letter concerning those of us in retired status; that we must make a report to our Charge Conference listing ministerial activity.” There was no response.
- Rev. Hung Choi – asked what happens when he retires to Korea where there is no UM church but only Korea Methodist Church? Rev. Grieb responded that a charge conference relationship must be established and consultation with an Episcopal leader must be maintained.

Rev. Choi made a motion: that the clergy be given additional time to re-think and vote on the matter at another time. This was seconded. The motion was not approved by overwhelming majority.

- Rev. Tony Campbell – shared a word of scripture. Rev. Grieb responded that great seriousness has been taken to work through this process and great oversight has been given to insure that all are treated fairly.
- Rev. Quentin Schultz – expressed his compassion and sensitivity for this situation concerning both Rev. Fultz and the BOM.
- Rev. Jack Larwa stated: “Had a proper relationship been maintained by (Rev.) Fultz, then this may not have been the issue that it is.” Rev. Grieb stated “this is part of the issue, plus the Church of the Savior is non-denominational and not under the appointment of the Louisville Area Episcopal leader.”
- Rev. Donna Morton – expressed her concern that the body needs more information before it can make a decision. She expressed that the Retired Clergy are held to a different standard than other clergy. Rev. Grieb responded to her comments by stating: “retirement is a different relationship but also an accountable relationship.”
- Rev. David Cheeks stated: “all of us need the opportunity to examine the Book of Discipline in this area which is very ‘gray’ and there is a need for more time before we vote on the issue with Rev. Fultz. There needs to be a ruling concerning what is the role of those in retirement status.”

There was an audible “Call for the Question” from the body.

Bishop Davis responded to the “Call for the Question.” A vote was taken and the majority of the body indicated it was ready to vote.

Question 46 b: The Bishop asked for a teller count: The vote was – yes (143); no (112); abstained (48). The recommendation is approved.

Rev. Fultz then requested to submit questions of law to be reviewed and sent on to the Judicial Council. This was affirmed.

Wednesday, June 9, 2010
AFTERNOON SESSION

OPENING WORSHIP CELEBRATION AND SERVICE OF REMEMBRANCE: The music for this service was provided by the Cardinal Singers from the Red Bird School. The participants for worship were the welcome and comments by Rev. Esther Jadhav Gohil and the Call to Worship by Rev. Clarenda Phillips. The opening hymn was entitled, “Lift High the Cross.” Bishop Richard Looney’s sermon was entitled “Lessons from the Valley”; the sermon text was taken from Psalm 40.

SERVICE OF REMEMBRANCE: Eleven clergy members and eight clergy spouses were memorialized. Each family of those remembered received a white rose, and clergy family members received a medallion also.

A SERVICE OF WORD AND TABLE: The service concluded with the celebration of communion.

PLENARY CALL TO ORDER: Bishop Davis called the annual conference session to order.

SPECIAL RECOGNITIONS: Bishop Davis recognized the following: Bishop Richard Looney (retired); Carol Ackley (Conference Lay Leader); Becki Curry (Assistant to the Bishop); Tom Smith (Director of Ministerial Services); Gary Graves (Associate Conference Secretary); Julie Hager Love (Director of Connectional Ministries & Conference Secretary) and Jody Curry (Conference Chancellor) who would be present the following day.

Organization of the Conference: Bishop Davis recognized Julie Hager Love, the conference secretary, who discussed organizational matters.

MOTION: Love moved for the adoption of the agenda as printed in the preconference report book (page 12) with the understanding that alterations in the agenda will be announced as they are deemed necessary. **The motion was carried.**

MOTION: Love moved that the following be set as orders of the day: Friday, June 11, 3:00 PM, the recognition of LACE graduates. **The motion was carried.**

MOTION: Love moved that the voting bar of the conference be all front sections of the room from the stage to the aisle that is parallel to the stage. On Saturday morning, members would be seated by district. **The motion was carried.**

MOTION: Love moved to elect Wayne Garvey to serve as the Assistant Secretary for Elections; Tukea Talbert as the Assistant Secretary for Daily Proceedings and Susan Jinnett-Sack as the Assistant Secretary for motions and reports. **The motion was carried.**

MOTION: Love moved for the election of the slate of tellers listed on the screen. **The motion was carried.** Love directed the tellers to meet with Wayne Garvey at the stage following the session.

MOTION: Love moved that the registration process serve as the roll of attendance. **The motion carried.**

MOTION: Love moved that we grant excused absences for clergy who have requested this. This was not voted on but provided for information only since the Bishop will be granting these.

WELCOME AND GREETINGS: Bishop Davis introduced Kevin Burney, the Covington District Superintendent, who welcomed the Bishop and members of the conference to Covington. Burney recognized the lead volunteers, Betty Minor and Jere McIntyre, and conveyed that proceeds from the T-shirts will go to Grace Campus. Burney presented the Bishop's wife, Jennifer, with roses.

FIRST READING OF BUDGET: Presented by George Strunk, the President of Council on Finance and Administration, and Michael Watts, the Conference Treasurer.

Strunk instructed members to the budget narrative on handout in the registration packet. Some of the budget highlights include:

- CFA is recommending a \$9,000,000 budget for 2011
- 3% increase in salaries for all staff including district superintendents and directors
- Up to 6% increase in healthcare costs
- 0.7% decrease in General Church apportionments
- \$42,350 increase in funds for First Start funds to build new congregations
- Maintain current funding level for camping ministries
- Budget reflects Louisville district superintendent serving as assistant to the bishop in 2011
- Board of Ordained Ministries will reduce funding for leave for ministers with the expectation that local churches will provide funding for ministers
- Board of Pensions will fund the office of the director of benefits services and related expenses from earning of reserves

Watts highlighted some key line items for budget 2011:

- General Church & SEJ (page 172, line 1): \$2,605,359.00 reflects a reduction of \$17,004.00 in comparison to 2010 budget
- NCCD (page 172, line 12): \$933,258.00 reflects a reduction of \$10,625.00 in comparison to 2010 budget
- Connectional Ministries (page 173, line 50): \$1,861,202.00 reflects a reduction of \$59,973.00 in comparison to 2010 budget
- Board of Ordained Ministries (page 175, line 149): \$378,045.00 reflects a reduction of \$16,982.00 in comparison to 2010 budget
- Primary Task Team (page 175, line 180): \$1,621,794.00 reflects a reduction of \$46,963.00 in comparison to 2010 budget
- Stewardship Team (page 176, line 209): \$1,414,092.00 reflects a reduction of \$74,586.00 in comparison to 2010 budget
- Annual Conference Session (page 177, line 244): \$186,250.00 reflects an increase of \$23,600.00 in comparison to 2010 budget
- Total Budget (page 177, line 260): \$9,000,000.00 reflects a reduction of \$232,531.00 in comparison to 2010

POINT OF ORDER: (MOTION): Gregg Graening moved (under Standing Rule 24 (f)) for a suspension of Standing Rule 11 (b) requiring the Committee on Standing Rules must be composed of an equal representation of clergy and lay person.

CONCURRENT MOTION: Graening moved for a suspension of Standing Rule 11(4) requiring the Committee on Standing Rules [sic to be] composed of eight members, one of whom is the chair. **The motions were carried.**

FIRST READING OF STANDING RULES: Neil Salvaterra, representing Kentucky Chief Justice John Minton, Jr., Chair of the Standing Rules Committee, who was in court during Conference, presented the following proposed changes to the standing rules listed on the white, stapled pages in the registration packet: change SR 2 (c) (2) (A) to add Conference Associate Lay Leaders to the Board of Lay Ministry; change SR 10 to eliminate Legislative Committees and have a consent calendar for reports; and change SR 11(d) (3) (A) to change the chair of the Committee on Nominations from the Assistant to the Bishop to the Director of Connectional Ministries.

FIRST READING OF NOMINATIONS: Becki Curry instructed members to refer to their packets at registration on the stapled white pages, which includes the full report. Curry instructed members to write any corrections down on paper and to submit them to the secretary's table following adjournment of the session. Curry reminded membership that the quadrennial elections were held in 2008 and the report reflects changes, which have occurred during the past year. The full list of the teams will be printed in the Journal. Curry instructed members to view the PowerPoint slides for additional changes. Bishop instructed the Nominations Committee's need to meet as soon as possible during this conference to meet the newly adopted standing rules that were listed as an addendum.

IMPACT ON COMMUNITY & AFTERNOON OF SERVICE: Scott Stith, Chair of the Afternoon Service for the Annual Conference for this year, discussed the service activities for the Covington community.

COURTESIES: Curry gave the following information on how members can be recognized for introductions, sending greetings, or points of personal privilege. Curry instructed members that in order to be recognized by the Bishop, they must go through the Committee on Courtesies. Dr. Rhoda Peters will serve as the chair of this committee. Curry informed members that Dr. Peters will be seated in the front. Curry instructed members on appropriate situations to recognize such as prayer requests, clergy from other conferences, institutional leaders who are not scheduled to be on the program, or visitors from General Boards and Agencies. Curry informed members that forms will be made available through Dr. Peters, the information desk located in the lobby, and in the office located upstairs in Ballroom E.

PETITIONS & RESOLUTIONS: Bruce Nettleton, Chair of the Petitions & Resolutions read the Resolution of Concern and Support for the Fijian Methodist Church (found on page 170 of preconference report book). The resolution was **adopted**, which was in concurrence with the recommendation of the Committee on Petitions & Resolutions.

Nettleton read a second resolution (found on page 171 of preconference report book), which was the Resolution on the United Methodist Lobby Office and Government Funded Abortion. The resolution was **not adopted**, which was in concurrence with the recommendation of the Committee on Petitions & Resolutions.

ANNOUNCEMENTS: Love gave the following announcements:

Closing remarks were given by Dr. Alice Rogers, the Director of Contextual Ministry, at Candler School of Theology. Rogers recognized Gilbert Schroerlucke for being awarded the Distinguished Alumnus to the Community Award from Candler School of Theology.

Rogers delivered the closing prayer and the session was adjourned.

Dr. Timothy Tennent. Tennent, President of Asbury Theological Seminary, delivered the sermon. The sermon, “Rebuilding the Pulpit,” was taken from Nehemiah 8:1-8. Thursday, June 10, 2010

MORNING SESSION

MORNING WORSHIP: Gathering music was provided by the Immanuel UMC Youth Band; Dance by the Asbury UMC Dance Team. Scripture read by Terry Cunningham and Cy Hudson, youth & young adult members of the conference.

BIBLE STUDY: Dr. Joy Moore led the Conference Bible study.

AFTERNOON OF SERVICE: At 2:00 p.m. some 600 people gathered to be “Sent to Serve.” They worked in 30 different locations on a variety of projects. These included Ida Spence Mission, seven nursing homes, and six prayer walks through the streets of Covington. At the Convention Center, 54 people gave blood at a blood drive. More than 500 agape letters were written to missionaries and soldiers around the world. Almost 1,000 Campbell’s Soup can labels were cut, sorted, and organized for use by the Red Bird Mission. Almost 50 tote bags were completed to give to local food pantries for food distribution. Over 1,700 Health Kits were completed, boxed and palletized to be sent to the United Methodist Committee on Relief.

Members and guests of the Conference brought over 1000 cans of food to the Convention Center and members of the youth and young adult delegation wheeled this food in grocery carts to two local food pantries. At Grace UMC, 150 meals were served, 1700 bottles of water were given away, and 85 different families received food from the outdoor pantry.

Friday, June 11, 2010

MORNING SESSION

MORNING WORSHIP: Gathering music was provided by Rev. Alvin Goodwin.

BIBLE STUDY: Dr. Joy Moore led the Conference Bible study.

Friday, June 11, 2010

PLENARY CALL TO ORDER: Bishop Davis called the meeting to order.

JOURNAL COMMITTEE: Janet Carden, Chair of the Journal Committee, stated the following motion, “The Conference Journal Committee move for the adoption of the minutes from June 9, 2010 as they were reviewed by the committee, and they are in order.” **The motion passed.**

MONITORING REPORT: Rachel Marshall presented the HERO (Helpful, Empathetic, Respectful, & Open-minded) Report. The HERO report was given daily to reflect the level of inclusiveness and participation on various Conference events and activities. Marshall recognized the following heroes: Dr. Joy Moore, designers of the chair arrangement for the Conference, and the members of the Kentucky Conference.

SPECIAL RECOGNITION: The Bishop presented the youngest youth member, Taylor Cain, with a Wesley Study Bible.

VIDEO PRESENTATIONS: Bishop Davis explained the purpose of the DVDs highlighting each district's ministries that would be seen throughout the plenary sessions.

VIDEO PRESENTATION: Video from the Ashland District was played.

LEGISLATIVE COMMITTEE OVERVIEW: Julie Hager Love gave the Conference an overview of how to use the consent calendars. Love focused specifically on the action items and the voting process.

LEGISLATIVE COMMITTEE 1: Facilitator, Ken Klemme/Recorder, Marie Hicks
Klemme presented the items on the consent calendar for approval. The items were **approved**.

Klemme introduced Dr. Tom Eblen, Director of New Church & Congregational Development (NCCD), who was accompanied by Karen Stigall, Chair of NCCD. Eblen introduced Eliseo Mejia, who discussed the Hispanic Course of Study Graduates. The following graduates completed the Garrett Seminary Course of Studies after five years of intensive studies: Marco A. Ballesteros, Alfonso Rodriguez, Nelson Figueroa, and Iosmar Alvarez.

Anthony Everett, Associate Director of African American Ministries, shared information about the Ebony Exploration Event, which was attended by ten youth from the KY Conference. New Church Plant Pastors and their families were presented in the video. Brian Ebel and Matthew Johnson, along with their families, were invited to the stage where the Bishop prayed for them.

Klemme moved for the entire report for legislative committee (1) be adopted and it was **adopted**.

VIDEO PRESENTATION: Video from the Bowling Green District was played.

LEGISLATIVE COMMITTEE 10: Facilitator, Debra Gaynor/Recorder, Scott Milby
Gaynor presented items on the consent calendar for approval. The items were **approved**.
Gaynor introduced Matthew Overing, youth representative, who introduced a video for Ministry with Young People. Overing presented the Bishop with signed golf balls from the youth representatives.

BLACK COLLEGE AMBASSADOR: Violet Mango, a student from Rust College addressed the conference and brought greetings from Rust College's administration and the appreciation of all those who benefit from the Black College Fund.

Gaynor introduced the college presidents of the United Methodist Colleges: Cheryl King (Kentucky Wesleyan College), Ed deRosset (Union College), and William Luckey (Lindsey Wilson College), who addressed the Conference.

Bishop Davis called Darren Brandon to the stage to offer prayer for the United Methodist Colleges and their presidents.

Tom Grieb and Mark Dickinson discussed the 25th Anniversary of New Song and shared a video. Grieb encouraged members of the Conference to attend the celebration of the New Song Music Festival Anniversary August 13-15.

John Boyd, Chair of Higher Education Team, introduced the Campus Ministers and Wesley Foundation Directors. Kent Lewis, Chaplain and Director of Church Relations at Kentucky Wesleyan College; Troy Elmore, Chaplain of Lindsey Wilson College; David Miller, Chaplain of Union College; Ken Southgate, Director/Campus Minister of Eastern Kentucky University Wesley Foundation; Kenny Simpson, Executive Director of Kentucky State University; Drew McNeill, Campus Minister of Morehead State University Wesley Foundation; Aaron Klinefelter, Campus Minister of Northern Kentucky University Wesley Foundation; Stephen Boutell, Director of the University of Louisville Wesley Foundation and Sami Wilson, Campus Minister for Western Kentucky University Wesley Foundation.

Dr. Kenneth Cummings delivered a prayer for all the campus ministers and Wesley Foundation Directors.

Gaynor moved that the entire report for legislative committee (10) be adopted. **The report was adopted.**

LAKE JUNALUSKA: Bishop Davis introduced Bob Ray from Lake Junaluska to address the Conference. Ray presented a video to the Conference on this year's events.

LEGISLATIVE COMMITTEE 5: Facilitator, Steve McVay/Recorder, Becky Jones

Julie Broderson, Chair of the Kentucky Annual Conference Missions Team, shared information about the Mission and Ministry Service. Una Jones, from the General Board of Global Ministries (GBGM) shared a video on missions. Jones highlighted three important mission opportunities for the Conference: (1) the Advance to which the Kentucky Annual Conference contributed \$221,871.00 for 2009 of which \$60,000.00 went to missionaries; (2) involvement of young people through the Be One Program; and (3) involvement in tenfold (10-10-2010) - ten projects, ten advocates, and 10,000.00 dollars is the goal. Jones applauded the KAC for their contribution of \$631,447.42 for the Haiti Relief.

Michael Morrissey talked about his and his wife Sherri's ministry in Thailand and requested prayer from the Conference.

McVay moved that the entire report of legislative committee (5) be adopted. **The report was adopted.**

Saturday, June 12, 2010
MORNING SESSION

Plenary Call to Order: Bishop Davis called the meeting to order.

JOURNAL COMMITTEE: Nancy Stilwell, member of the Journal Committee, made the following motion: “The minutes from June 11, 2010 as they were reviewed and are in order. We, the Journal Committee request the Kentucky Annual Conference approve the continued review of today’s proceedings.” **The motion passed.**

COURTESIES: The courtesies were read by Dr. Rhoda Peters. Peters requested that the Conference send greetings to Louise Short, who is 103 years and a long-term conference attendee. Peters concluded her report by thanking the entire Conference, the Bishop and all the volunteers for their great work.

VOLUNTEER RECOGNITION: Betty Minor thanked all the volunteers and had them stand at the front of the stage. Geraniums used to decorate the stage were provided by the Henderson Settlement and will be donated to host members.

MISSION OFFERING: Michael Watts announced that the Conference exceeded the \$100,000 goal for the mission offering by \$98,843.05. Watts stated that the Conference would likely raise more than \$200,000 in total for Missions.

LEGISLATIVE COMMITTEE 8: Facilitator, Chris Patterson/Recorder, Pat Hoeksema Patterson presented items on the consent calendar for approval and the items were **approved.**

Communications Ministries report lifted with one negative vote. The committee recommended concurrence with the report with the one action item receiving one negative vote. The Conference **voted in favor of the recommendation** by the legislative committee (8) for concurrence.

Cathy Bruce, Associate Director of Connectional Ministries for Communication, discussed the new kyumc website and encouraged members to view the changes made to the site based on member’s feedback.

Patterson moved that the entire report of legislative committee (8) be adopted and it was **adopted.**

VIDEO PRESENTATION: Video from the Louisville District was played.

UPPER ROOM 75TH ANNIVERSARY: Rev. Tom Albin brought greetings from Karen Greenwalt, General Secretary of General Board of Discipleship, and Sarah Wilke, publisher and Associate General Secretary of the Upper Room. Albin presented a video on global prayer and ministry. Albin requested continued prayer for the Upper Room Ministry.

LEGISLATIVE COMMITTEE 3: Facilitator, Chris Morgan/Recorder, Lynda Adkins Morgan presented the items on the consent calendar for approval with the exception of the Budget Report. **The items were approved.**

The Board of Pensions Report, action item 12, starting at line 10 underwent some editorial changes that required a separate vote. This change read (changes are bolded & italicized): The Conference Board of Pensions is recommending contribution rates for the Conference healthcare *which would be up to a 6% increase from 2010. If it is as high as 6%*, contribution rates for Conference healthcare would be \$1050.00 per month for the church or participating institution from January 1, 2011 to December 31, 2011. The family plan is an additional \$690.00 per month from January 1, 2011 to December 31, 2011. The combined cost will be \$1740.00 per month. *Finalized 2011 contribution rates will be available October 2010.* Following a brief discussion by Ken Peters, President of Board of Pensions and Rob Moorlach, **the body approved this action item.**

Paul Whalen, Chair of Commission on Archives and History, discussed an editorial change in this report on page 53 (line 39) that needed to reflect the number “2” in the total.

Michael Watts honored Jane Ryan for her 30 years of service and acknowledged her upcoming retirement in the fall. Ryan was presented with 30 red roses representing each year of service.

Morgan moved that the entire report of legislative committee (3) be adopted. **The report was adopted.**

VIDEO PRESENTATION: Video from the Owensboro District was played.

INTRODUCTION OF STAFF: Julie Hager Love recognized all of the hard work and effort of the Conference staff to make the Conference a success. Individuals recognized were asked to come to the stage while their names were called.

SECOND READING OF THE BUDGET: George Strunk and Michael Watts led the discussion and reinforced budget highlights stated on Wednesday, June 9, 2010. Strunk moved for the approval of the budget for 2011 and it was **approved.**

NOMINATIONS REPORT: Becki Curry requested the approval of the nominations report with the addition of the editorial changes. The report was **approved.**

CLOSINGS/MERGERS/LINE CHANGES: Dr. Kenneth Cummings presented the following:

- Question 14: What local churches have been:
 - a) Organized or chartered?
 - (1) New Church Start
 - Remove Grace UMC in the Covington District from New Church Start
- Question 16: What changes have been made in district and charge lines? By cabinet approval these changes have been approved.
 - Columbia District: Dissolve the Oak Grove/Bon Ayr Charge and both become station churches
- Discontinuance resolutions (changes are bolded & italicized)
 - With Worthington Chapel in Covington District and resolution should read as, “NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the 2010 Kentucky Annual Conference held at Covington, Kentucky, June 9-12, 2010 declare the Worthington Chapel UMC to be discontinued and that the Conference Trustees be instructed *to dispose of the property consistent with SR 21(a) of the 2009 Conference Journal* that reads, “Net proceeds from the sale of any closed, discontinued or abandoned African-American Church or other Ethnic Church property and assets as well as existing funds from previous acts will be placed with the District whose boundaries include said church. These funds are to be restricted for the development or revitalization of African-American Churches and Ethnic Churches relative to the particular ethnicity served by the properties that are sold...”

VIDEO PRESENTATION: Video from the Prestonsburg District was played.

ANNUAL CONFERENCE 2011

The Bishop set the dates for the KAC for 2011 for June 8-11 at the Northern Kentucky Convention Center in the Covington District.

ANNOUNCEMENTS: Julie Hager Love gave some brief announcements.

Annual Conference concluded with the setting of the appointments, the reading of new appointments, and sending forth by the Bishop.

Monitoring for Inclusiveness

The Ministry of Monitoring is administered under the guidance of the Commission on the Status and Role of Women and the Commission on Religion and Race, in cooperation with the Mission and Justice Ministry Teams.

GOAL OF MONITORING

The goal of this ministry is to build and strengthen inclusive participation during our Annual Conference session. This presentation is designed to educate and build awareness and sensitivity to the status of everyone in our conference regardless of race, gender, special needs, or age.

DATA GATHERING AND REPORTING

The information was gathered by a team of volunteer observers. Monitoring is in many ways an inexact science, as observers are asked to assess age and ethnicity, as well as gender and clergy/laity status. Observers were present in all plenary sessions, worship sessions, and in most legislative sessions.

HERO REPORT

The HERO Report was included as a part of the Ministry of Monitoring. HERO is an acronym for Honest, Empathetic, Respectful, and Open-minded. The HERO Report is intended to highlight some aspect of the conference in which attention to inclusivity is especially noted.

The HERO Report this year recognized Dr. Joy Moore for helping us to celebrate diversity as she reminded us that as we cast out our nets we are to rejoice over all the kinds of “fish” that are gathered in the nets.

The HERO Report recognized the attention to inclusiveness of those unnamed persons who set up the chairs in the hall for all the sessions. The arrangement of chairs allowed for wheelchairs to be placed in various places throughout the hall; not just along the back.

The HERO Report celebrated that great diversity of persons and tasks as the members of the Conference spread out across the city of Covington, serving others in God’s name.

CONCLUSIONS

As the team reviewed the statistical data, we are most grateful that our Conference is committed to diversity in leadership and participation. We continue to believe that as a Conference we need to encourage and promote leadership among our young adults. We see evidence where this is being done in various ways. Attention to racial equality is an ongoing concern, not only in levels of leadership but also at the grass roots level of our churches. We pray that our Conference will continue to move toward the vision and goal of Galatians 3:28, in which “all of you are one in Christ Jesus.”
